Lasagna Rolls

From Elly Urciuoli

Ingredients:

Bechamel Sauce:

2 tablespoons unsalted butter

4 teaspoons flour
11/4 cups whole milk
12/4 teaspoon salt
13/4 teaspoon black pepper
pinch nutmeg

Lasagna:

1 (32 ounce) container whole milk ricotta

- 1 (10 ounce) package frozen chopped spinach, thawed, squeezed dry
- 11/4 cups grated Parmesan
- 3 ounces thinly sliced prosciutto, chopped
- 1 large egg, beaten ¾ teaspoon salt
- ½ teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 2 tablespoons olive oil 12 uncooked lasagna sheets 2 cups marinara sauce 1 cup shredded mozzarella

Directions:

Melt butter in saucepan over medium-low heat. Add flour; whisk for three minutes. Whisk in milk. Increase heat to medium-high. Whisk the sauce until it simmers and is thick and smooth, about three minutes. Whisk the salt, pepper and nutmeg into the bechamel sauce.

Preheat oven to 450° F.

Whisk ricotta, spinach, one cup Parmesan, prosciutto, egg, ¾ teaspoon salt and the pepper in medium bowl to blend.

Add olive oil to a large pot of salted boiling water. Boil noodles until just tender but still firm; drain. Arrange noodles in single layer on a baking sheet to prevent them from sticking.

Butter a 13" x 9" Pyrex baking dish. Pour in the bechamel sauce. Lay out four lasagna sheets on a work surface; spread three tablespoons of ricotta mixture evenly over each. Roll each sheet like a jelly roll. Lay the lasagna rolls seam side down, without touching, on bechamel. Repeat with remaining noodles and ricotta mixture. Spoon one cup of marinara sauce over lasagna rolls. Top with mozzarella and remaining Parmesan. Cover tightly with foil. Bake until heated through and the sauce bubbles, about 20 minutes. (Meanwhile, heat remaining marinara sauce.) Uncover the lasagna rolls and bake until the cheese becomes golden, about 15 minutes longer. Let stand for 10 minutes.



Bowtie Bulletin Receives Honorable Mention in Golden Quill Awards

As chief judge for the Golden Quill Award selections, I can say 2020 was far from a normal year, yet publications adjusted. Much credit can be given to club editors, their support teams and club officials who backed the adjustments.

As a result of the impact of COVID-19 upon publications, there were some adjustments to the 2020 Golden Quill Award categories. The categories that publications are judged within always relates to size, page counts and print quality. From that information, the 2020 Golden Quill Awards are categorized as such: National publications are placed in Luxury, Intermediate and Compact categories plus Museum and Special Purpose publications. Regional Publications are categorized into Full-size and Compact. Winners are judged in these categories for balanced content, layout, design, photographs and overall quality. The Honorable Mention list includes publications with good promise and content, but were not as exemplary as category winners. Certificates for the award are being given to category winners only.

Creativity amid the challenges of 2020 was notable in several publications, whether those were award-winning or not. Some club editors used their time on quarantine to research interesting tidbits of automotive and club history, then included their findings in their club publications. Some club officials and editors found innovative ways to unite their members from afar. To press this point, here are a handful of examples of the many creative topics and ideas that appeared in club publications during 2020:

Among museums, David Coco, editor of *Great Arrow News* (publication of the Pierce-Arrow Museum), published five pages on the prototype 1920 Waldon. This stillborn effort of Colonel Sidney D. Waldon to work with Pierce-Arrow in production of a quality lower-cost passenger vehicle was featured in the publication's July issue. The related group of articles further preserve a seldom-known piece of history.

As editor of the *Steering Wheel Newsletter*, publication of the Studebaker Drivers Club's Missouri-Illinois Gateway Chapter, Ed Meyer detailed dealerships in a series of issues by drawing from postwar regional newspaper ads and articles. Thus, the compilation provides insightful "period" reading.

The Cruisin' Tigers Pontiac Club kept collector car interests moving forward in conjunction with Don Keefe's *Poncho Perfection* print efforts. The club provided input for the classified advertising section, thus allowing the hobby and car ownership to perpetuate.

With Ken Dunning serving as editor, Peachstate Packards Region ran a series of vintage excerpts in *Packard Profiles*. The excerpts were derived from the rare publication "The Saga of Packard," which was published by the car company upon its 50th anniversary in 1949. One wonders how many copies remain.

To make the most of canceled events, the *Newsletter* of the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Club saw a cooperative effort between club officials (headed by president Craig Birkhold and including editor Shannon Olson) and the Auburn Cord Duesenberg Automobile Museum. Included in a fall issue of the *Newsletter* was a handful of club "goodies" marking what would have been the 65th Annual Reunion of the club on Labor Day weekend. A "retrospective" on past reunions was the major feature in that issue. Together, the package bound club members together even though they didn't formally meet.

Editor's Note: I am happy to report that thanks to your efforts to continue to send me materials, the Bowtie Bulletin at least received an honorable mention. Please keep the material flowing to keep this newsletter filled.

A huge shout out goes to Generator & Distributor editor, Vince Taliano for receiving a Golden Quill in the National Luxury class for our national publication. Congratulations Vince.

The Origin of Father's Day

Last month, I included a story on the origin of Mother's Day, so in the spirit of equality, I am providing some background on the history of Father's Day.

Every year, on the third Sunday in June, Americans take time to honor fathers and their role in the family and community. While many Americans may be planning to celebrate their fathers this year, few know about the woman who launched a 62-year campaign to establish the day as a federal holiday.

The mother of Father's Day

When Sonora Louise Smart Dodd was 16 years old, her father became a widower and was left to raise Dodd and her five younger brothers alone. In 1909, Dodd was listening to a Mother's Day sermon when she realized the need for a day to celebrate fathers, especially her own.

Inspired, Dodd drew up a petition for the first Father's Day, which she argued should be celebrated on her father's birthday in early June. Even though the petition only earned two signatures, Dodd convinced several local church communities to participate—on the condition she push the date to late June to give them more time to prepare. The resulting celebration, in Spokane, Washington, kicked off Dodd's nearly life-long mission of promoting Father's Day for national status. Over the next half-century, Dodd would travel the United States, speaking on behalf of Father's Day and campaigning for the cause. (Continued on Page 7.)

Although Mother's Day was declared a national holiday in 1914, Father's Day wasn't nationally recognized until 1972. Throughout the years, Presidents Woodrow Wilson, Calvin Coolidge, and Lyndon B. Johnson all wrote in favor of the holiday, but none passed legislation ratifying the holiday during their term. In 1970, Congress finally passed Joint Resolution 187, which called on citizens to "offer public and private expressions of such day to the abiding love and gratitude which they bear for their fathers." President Richard Nixon signed the resolution into law two years later.

A new appreciation of fatherhood

On the first Father's Day in Spokane, families honored fathers by wearing roses—red for those still alive, and white for those who were deceased. Pastors in Presbyterian and Methodist churches gave Father's Day sermons. The city's mayor and even the state's governor issued Father's Day proclamations.

Today, Father's Day is often celebrated with food, gatherings, and gifts. This year, Americans are expected to spend \$17 billion for Father's Day, with the most popular gifts being greeting cards, clothing, and gift cards, according to the National Retail Federation.

Since Father's Day was first conceived, the nature of fatherhood itself has shifted. Most fathers are no longer the sole breadwinners and have become more involved in family life. Today, American fathers spend an average of eight hours a week on childcare—nearly three times as many hours as they did in 1965. However, less than half of American fathers believe they are doing a "very good job" raising their children.

Fatherhood has, and continues to be, both a demanding and gratifying endeavor. Father's Day is an occasion to thank every person who has embraced the challenging role. "If the father's responsibilities are many, his rewards are also great—the love, appreciation, and respect of children and spouse," wrote President Lyndon B. Johnson.


